Could you please introduce yourself and tell us a little about your career?

My name is Tom Goen. I'm Class of '70, and I've been in several positions with, generally with the state of Texas or in private business. Initially, I worked for the General Land Office in Austin, and then after some private fee appraisal work I moved into the system real estate office for Texas A&M University System, and then, since retirement I have gone back into doing fee appraisal work on a, on a private basis.

Could you tell us a little about your experiences at Texas A&M?

Well, my experiences at A&M are, have been really important in my life and primarily in graduate school. That was one of the forming periods of my whole career. I came back from the service and needed a change in direction and, and went into grad school there at Texas A&M, and it was a wonderful experience. The, the professors, primarily Ivan Schmedemann, and some of the others as well, Pat Wooten and so forth, were extremely important in instructing me on how to go out into the world and really make a difference.

Can you describe your early career?

In my early career when I first came out of graduate school, out of the real estate program, I went to work briefly for the city of Bryan in their land appraisal department and then went to work for the general land office in Austin and worked for them for a number of years for appraising state land and private land for both the state of Texas and for the Veterans Land System, and after I left the General Land Office, I went to the, went to the Texas A&M University System where I helped them to manage their properties that all of the agencies and universities under the Texas A&M University system umbrella owned out there, and then we were able to buy and sell and lease and manage those properties for them.

What advice do you have for students of agricultural economics?

One of the main pieces of advice that I have is to try and maintain flexibility in your career. I think that one of the things that we do is focus on a certain aspect of our career, and often through our career we're, we have to make changes in our life, both in our business and also in our personal life, where we live and so forth, so don't forget that you, you need to maintain some flexibility throughout your career. Things change so quickly these days that you, sometimes you need to adjust to keep things on an even keel.

How were you able to manage time for family, work and other priorities throughout your career?

Well, I was lucky, especially early in my career, to have a very cooperative and helpful spouse, and she was able to carry the load on a lot of the family problems while I was off making a living and, and doing those sorts of things, and luckily a little later on when the children were a little bigger, I had the opportunity to move into another position where I was able to stay home and take on more of those responsibilities and try to balance my life a little more between work and family.

In your opinion, what does it take to achieve success?

Success is kind of a hard thing to measure. It's not always in dollars. One of the things that, that you have to do to succeed in life, in my opinion, is to try and find a profession that you really like to do. In order to really have success, you have to have a goal and enjoy the process of getting there and making that goal achievable. So, one of the main things is to, is to choose something that you, you really enjoy, and then, then the workload is not nearly as hard, and, and you can be more successful in, at the end of the day.

What are your thoughts on being selected to the Tyrus R. Timm Honor Registry

Well, I'm very honored to be chosen for this. It's a really wonderful group of people that have been entered into the registry, and, and I count myself very honored and lucky to be included with those other people.
